Letter from Tish & Suzanne

We are proud to share the Intelligence and National Security Alliance (INSA) Fiscal Year 2025 Annual Report, marking another year of remarkable growth, record participation, and meaningful impact across the intelligence and national security community.



From October 2024 through September 2025, INSA deepened collaboration among the public, private, and academic sectors to advance practical solutions to today's most pressing intelligence and national security priorities. This shared mission continues to define who we are and why we exist: to strengthen trust, foster innovation, and build enduring partnerships.

This year, INSA membership reached a record 180 corporate members, including 42 new organizations, reflecting strong engagement from both long-standing industry partners and emerging innovators. Our expanding membership base demonstrates the growing value IC professionals see in being part of the INSA community.



FY25 was also a landmark year for program participation. Across 28 events, INSA welcomed more than 11,000 registrants, a testament to the relevance and impact of our programming. The 40th William Oliver Baker Award Dinner brought together over 700 leaders to honor former CIA Director The Hon. William J. Burns, while the Intelligence and National Security Summit, co-hosted with AFCEA, set new records with more than 2,100 attendees and a sold-out exhibit hall.

We also expanded our classified programming, hosting four TS/SCI discussions with senior leaders from NSA, NGA, NRO, DIA, and the U.S. Space Force. These sessions provided

trusted, mission-focused dialogue that strengthened collaboration across the intelligence enterprise.

Our policy councils remained the backbone of INSA's thought leadership, convening more than 1,200 participants through 37 meetings and releasing timely publications on Al and insider risk and an impactful op-ed on clearance reform. These efforts reinforce INSA's role as a convener of expertise and a catalyst for actionable solutions.

Beyond the Beltway, our inaugural Common Threads Charlottesville drew over 300 participants, underscoring the region's growing role as a national security hub and INSA's commitment to expanding engagement nationwide.

The INSA Foundation continued to invest in the future of the intelligence workforce, awarding \$60,000 in scholarships to eight outstanding undergraduate and master's students pursuing intelligence and national security careers.

Looking ahead, we will build on this momentum through expanded classified programming, deeper regional engagement, and new initiatives that elevate member impact and advance solutions to emerging challenges.

We are deeply grateful to our members, sponsors, and partners for their trust, leadership, and unwavering support. Together, we are advancing a more unified and resilient intelligence and national security community.














CONNECTING LEADERS, STRENGTHENING PARTNERSHIPS




NEW THIS YEAR



FIXING THE CLEARANCE **BOTTLENECK:** CUT RED TAPE, **NOT CAPABILITIES**

The July op-ed, Fixing the Clearance Bottleneck: Cut Red Tape, Not Capabilities, by Security Policy Reform Council Chair Don Blersch and Vice Chair Lindy Kyzer, appeared in Federal News Network. It emphasized the need to modernize and standardize clearance transfer processes across agencies so the intelligence workforce can move efficiently where it is most needed, strengthening mission agility and reducing administrative barriers.

WHITE PAPERS

COUNTERING **INSIDER THEFT** OF NATIONAL **SECURITY TECHNOLOGY**

INSA's Insider Threat Subcommittee released a white paper examining the growing risk of insider-enabled intellectual property theft

targeting U.S. national security technologies. The paper outlines how foreign adversaries, particularly the CCP, are increasingly using cyber and human intelligence operations to gain access to sensitive innovations developed outside the traditional classified space.





RECOMMENDATIONS WHEN **USING AI IN INSIDER RISK MANAGEMENT**

In August, the Insider Threat Subcommittee released an Intelligence Insights paper that examined how Al can support early detection of risky behaviors and accelerate response to potential insider threats. The publication underscored the importance of balancing technological innovation with ethical use, human oversight, and clear governance frameworks.

The Intelligence Career Conversations podcast continued to grow in popularity and impact over the past year, offering listeners authentic insights and practical advice from leaders across government, industry, and academia. In FY25, the Intelligence Champions Council released 29 new episodes featuring honest discussions, lessons learned, and guidance for those navigating careers in intelligence and national security.


